\$1,000 Retirement Bonus To 45-Year Service Employees

A new awards program honoring Mueller Co. employees on their service anniversary will go into effect January 1. The program which affects all company employees in the United States was announced by President Albert G. Webber, Jr.

years service also will receive a gift certificate (at five-year intervals) on their anniversary.

The highlight of the new program will be the presentation of a \$1,000 bonus check to all employees who retire with 45 or more years service, providing they are eligible for benefits under Mueller Co.'s retirement trust fund.

"Because Mueller Co. Management is of the opinion that long and faithful somice is not only beneficial to the employees but to the company and community as well," Mr. Webber said, "Mueller Co. has adopted this program in order that it might provide the deserved recognition and appreciation for this service to the company."

The new program just approved by the Executive Committee, was originated by O. E. Walker, Vice-President and Works Manager.

Mr. Webber said that recognition of the employees' service will be on the anniversary date rather than at year end as has been customary in the past. Employees who retire between the five-year intervals of the schedule (except 45 years of service or more) will receive the gift certificate of the next higher five-year level. For instance, if you retire after having just completed 25 years service, you will receive the 30-year gift certificate the day of your retirement.

Fifteen years — pin and \$10.00 gift certificate. Twenty years — pin and \$20.00 gift certificate.


