## 2,200 Tons **Of Steelwork** In Expansion

The first part of nearly 2,200 tons of structural steel is now being erected on the expansion site in Decatur.

A total of 290 tons of steel was erected in two weeks for the office building and on March 13 steel started going up for the first phase of the manufacturing building. It will take from two to three weeks to erect the 685 tons of steel for the first portion of the manufacturing building.

The largest single piece of steel is 651/2 feet long, has a 30inch flange and weighs 12,445 pounds or about 190 pounds a running foot.

Mississippi Valley Structural Steel Co. of Decatur is furnishing the steel and its subsidiary, Northwest Steel Erection Co. of Rockford, Ill., is putting it up.

While the steel is going up for the manufacturing building, concrete floor slabs will be poured and masonry work will continue on the office building. The masonry work for the office is expected to be completed late in May; the building will be enclosed shortly thereafter.

The manufacturing building is expected to be enclosed by early July, according to work schedules arranged by the contractors.




## Dean Grant Named **Assembly Foreman** In Ground Key

Only five pins separated fourth place from tenth.


