Mueller Picnics





The Mueller Co. knew how to party. Ask any former employee or family member about the "old Mueller picnics," and chances are a smile will proceed their account. But that person has to be really old.

The first picnic was held September 10, 1898, on a farm near Decatur and was sponsored by the Mutual Benefit Association. Approximately 400 employees and their family members were taken to the William Hunter farm on the Vandalia Railroad (the interurban).

The second year picnic was held in Mackinaw Falls near Peoria and was attended by approximately 1300 persons who were transported to the site by the P.D. & E. Railroad (Peoria, Decatur, Evansville). Before the picnic, a huge parade was held in downtown Decatur with a platoon of police and 35 members of the Goodman Band (which is still in existence and is known as the country's oldest band). They were followed by family members. The day was filled with dancing, games, a swimming exhibit, picnic and more music.

The third picnic was held June 23, 1900, in Paris (that's Paris, *Illinois*) and once again, a parade was held in Decatur and also for the Parisians. The event was so successful, it was held there the following year.

In this photo in 1899, Hieronymus is seen in front walking with two of his grandsons. Our summer exhibit in the Museum will feature photographs and programs from these fun-filled summer days. You won't want to miss it!

These picnics were amazing. They weren't your usual "rent-the-pavilion-and-invite-Grandma-and-her-tuna-casserole" type of picnics. These were huge and were held in surrounding towns and cities using the interurban rail system. (In fact, it was probably easier to get to some of these places a hundred years ago than it is today--especially if you have an entourage of about 1300 people!) The "trains" just added special cars.

Games, picnics, picture-taking, sports, parades and even a borrowed carousel have been highlights of these fine outings, which are still talked about by some of our visitors.

The picnics were held in Mueller Heights beginning in 1932, and the 100th Anniversary Picnic was held in 1957 in Fairview Park. (Most of our 67 volunteers remember that one and the barbecued chicken!)

To help us in our exhibit, would you take some time and dig out old pictures and memories you may have of these events for a special scrapbook? (We'll return them. Just put your name and address on the back.)

Once in a while, someone will comment that he or she was a former employee of the Mueller Co. and then ask "Why don't I get your newsletter?"


